CANAL PROJECT LATEST



Brimscombe: Whilst engineering feasibility continues. SDC has purchased the Ship Inn (left). The pub stands on the corner of the Brimscombe Hill road and the canal's route. As such, it is highly likely that some of its car park will be needed both for the canal and for construction of a new road bridge over the River Frome and the canal. Purchasing the pub avoids possible compulsory purchase action being needed in the future. Even better news is that the pub is staying open!



Ryeford: Work by our Tuesday and Thursday volunteers continues on upgrading the towpath here, following the completion of bank stabilisation work by Cotswold Canals Trust volunteers. Most of the initial upgrade work is complete, with the emphasis moving to surfacing. Piling work at Ford's Wharf (left) is continuing. A landing stage, funded by SDC, has been installed immediately upstream of Ryeford swing bridge. Periodic towpath closures will continue to be necessary.

Stonehouse Ocean: Our own volunteers are working with Cotswold Canals Trust volunteers to clear vegetation from the Ocean at Stonehouse. This triangular expanse of water was probably so named because it was the biggest expanse of water anyone had seen in the 1770s! Self seeded willow trees, which have fallen over and then regrown are being removed, in turn allowing removal of the vegetation 'mat', thus increasing the expanse of water.

Bowbridge: Work on the lock and the wall between the lock and bridge is now complete, with just a small amount of tidying up and landscaping to be completed. Britannia Construction has fully returned to site with bridge works expected to be completed in June.

We are now near to concluding an agreement with Knightstone Housing Association for construction of a disabled access ramp from the towpath up into Eagle Mill Close. This is important, because the geometry of the original bridge and towpath does not permit disabled access along the towpath itself.

Netherlands Visit: We were pleased to host a visit by 15 people from the regional government of Noord-Brabant, the city of Breda, a national park and the regional water boards. The team was on a 5 day UK visit and spent 1 day with us. Their particular interests were our recent involvement with Help for Heroes and how we recruit, train and organise volunteers.

Phase 1B - Stonehouse to Saul: SDC's £3m contribution to restoration west of Stonehouse has now been confirmed. This is matched funding towards the revised Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) bid to be submitted in November and should transform its prospects of success.

West of the A38, our volunteers have continued clearance of 250m of canal, ably assisted by yet more Waterway Recovery Group volunteers on weekend camps. This work will be reduced shortly due to the onset of the bird nesting season.

Survey work at Westfield Lock has now been completed. Certainty of funding is now required before restoration can begin, as is a definite plan for routing the Oldbury Brook either under or into the canal. We are in discussion with the neighbouring landowner to this effect.

ASH DIEBACK



Ash dieback, also known as Chalara dieback of ash, has been identified at a number of sites across the district, where it has resulted in the loss of dozens of young trees.

Ash dieback was first identified in Poland in 1992, since when it has spread across Europe reaching the UK in 2012. It has been estimated that between 90% and 99% of the 80 million ash trees in the UK could be killed by the disease.

The disease, which is caused by a fungi called *Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*, results in leaf loss, crown dieback and bark lesions in affected trees. Once a tree is infected the disease is usually fatal, either directly, or indirectly by weakening the tree to the point where it succumbs more readily to attacks by other pests or pathogens. Younger trees are usually the first to show signs of the disease, which takes longer to weaken and kill older trees.

There is no 'cure' for Ash dieback. The best hope for the long-term future of Britain's ash trees lies in identifying the genetic factors which enable some ash trees to tolerate or resist infection, and using these to breed new generations of disease tolerant trees.

MAKE SURE YOU'RE REGISTERED!

Ahead of the County Council Elections taking place on **Thursday 4 May**, Stroud District Council is urging its residents to get involved by registering to vote.

Since the law changed in June 2014, every individual is now responsible for their own registration, rather than registering as a household. Anyone who has changed their address or is a new voter needs to make sure that they are registered. Not being on the electoral register could also affect your credit rating.

Registering to vote is easy and can be done online by visiting www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. Those registering will need to provide their date of birth and national insurance number. Anyone without internet can contact the elections team.

You can register to vote at any time, but the deadlines for registration ahead of the election are:

- Last date for Registration Thursday 13 April
- Last date for Postal Vote Applications Tuesday 18 April
- Last date for Proxy Vote Applications Tuesday 25 April

The publication of candidates standing in the elections will be available from Tuesday 4 April for the County Council Elections. If you would like to know more about electoral registration, or request registration forms, please contact the elections team.

Stroud's proud film history – 'Moving Art: Animation in Stroud'

Did you know that Stroud was home to a famous animation studio? It is a story that was left untold, until now. The Museum in the Park is creating a new public programme around the history of animation in the Stroud District. The Museum now hosts a new display telling the story of two influential animation companies, Anson Dyer and Halas and Batchelor. The display is centred around the Acmiola machine that was used at the Halas and Batchelor studio in Stroud. With the Stroud District now being promoted as a great filming location, the new display shows that it was also the location of some preeminent film makers. The project will culminate with an exhibition of cels and drawings created by Halas and Batchelor. New school sessions are being developed based around a new character, 'The Animator'. A series of workshops run by local artist Tracy Spiers and Aardman Animation will allow three different age groups to create works inspired by animation. This exciting project has been made possible by a grant from Arts Council England through their Grant for the Arts programme which is funded by the National Lottery. 'Moving Art: Animation in Stroud' will run in Gallery 2, from 7th March to 2nd April (due to the shared use of the gallery please check before travelling to ensure the gallery is open). American Civil War Gun Running and the Museum!

Last winter the Museum was fortunate to receive some pro bono expert assistance with cataloguing our firearms collection. Brian Godwin, who is the Adviser on Firearms to the National Trust worked through our collections and identified several pieces as being of special interest. He was particularly fascinated by a revolver, described as American and c.1860 in our records, and following extensive research he has uncovered an incredible story of gun-running during the American Civil War. The revolver is a Systeme LeMat type, made by Charles Frederic Girard and Son of Paris between 1864-5. From Paris, the revolver was sent to London where it was tested and proved to be safe – it was then inspected by Lieutenant William H. Murdaugh of the Confederate Navy who stamped his mark on the barrel. From London it was then shipped to Bermuda, where it was transferred to a fast boat that could avoid the naval blockade imposed by the Northern States. It is reasonable to assume (though not proven) that the gun ran the blockade and landed up in Wilmington, Charleston or perhaps Savannah, from whence it could be forwarded to the troops who were in need of ordnance. Unfortunately, what happened next remains a mystery, as does how it ended up in the hands of John Stuart Daniels - one of the Museum's early Trustees and the donor of the piece to the collection. What we can say is that today, it is an extremely rare piece and having uncovered its story, we will be delighted to be displaying the gun in the Collectors' Room from April – June.

Changes in ICT

There have been a few changes in ICT as we prepare for Channel Shifting – you can find out what this is at this month's Proud of Stroud sessions:.

- Sean Ditchburn has taken on the role of ICT Manager, vacated by Stuart Spain. We will also be looking at revising and recruiting other team members to take us forward
- Over the next 12 months we will be migrating Councillors and Staff from the current, unsupported, version of Office, to the latest Office 365. This will make it far easier to get access to emails and key documents when on the move
- We are moving all our log-on details to a new server, ready for working with the cloud and Office 365. We are testing this on a select group of guinea pigs – sorry I meant volunteers. Please bare with us as we do the migration
- This will also mean upgrading our Email Server. As such, over the next month we will have to schedule some down-time for essential maintenance. We hope to schedule these at the end of the working day (possibly 16:00 to 17:00) so as to reduce disruption. During maintenance you will not be able to send or receive emails or check your diary. Don't worry, as incoming emails will be stacked up and will appear in the morning.

Cyber Attacks

The Council has once again passed its internet security testing and has been certified by the Cabinet Office to be part of the .Gov sisterhood. However, this is not a time for complacency. As with all .Gov websites we are under constant attack from both amateurs and criminal gangs. One route being used by these hackers is to get us to do their dirty work for them. They send unsolicited emails to staff in the hopes that they will open attachments, usually purporting to be invoices or word documents. The vast majority are intercepted by our Internet Service Provider (ISP) but some new ones inevitably get in.

Staff and members are reminded of the Internet Security Policy which states that users will take care in opening unsolicited emails. This means emails from people and companies you don't know. If you are in any doubt

- Do not open the email or any attachments
- Contact Help Desk immediately
- Do not delete the email at this time as ICT will need info on the email to trace the sender and block further attempts
- If told to delete, hold the 'Shift' button when you click 'Delete' as this sends it to Email Oblivion rather than the waste bin.

You may also get emails asking for personal data including email addresses and user names. Staff must never give out such information. It may appear to be trivial, however, each piece of information reveals a layer of our security.

ICT Dos and Don'ts

Every user of the SDC network, both staff and members are required to comply with our ICT Security Policy. The following are the headlines which everyone needs to take on board

Users must not

- Reveal their login name, password or Bitlocker code to any one*
- Attempt to attach USB devices, hard discs or mobile phones to any SDC machine or secure network, or interfere with the security of the system
- Use any SDC machine, software or network for personal activities*
- Forward emails to external email accounts where they contain personal or confidential information. Bulk forwarding of emails is strictly prohibited
- · Pass any personal or confidential information to a third party*
- Attempt to upload or download files to cloud storage sites such as Dropbox*
- Use council equipment to listen to, view, create or send inappropriate contents
- Play games, access private social media sites or external email accounts
- Allow viruses or other malicious content to access the system
- Use phones, laptops or tablets equipment when driving
- Allow family, friends or any third party to use any SDC machine, or to see contents whilst in use.

Users must

- Keep their allocated equipment safe and secure~
- Keep your Bitlocker, Fortinet and/or Vasco token separate from your laptop or tablet when not in use
- Have regard to the content of any file, email or communication before sharing it with others
- Restrict personal access to the internet to scheduled breaks and lunch-times
- Avoid using personal mobile phones in work time*
- Keep their desk clear of confidential and sensitive information
- Delete old information from your systems when it is no longer required; in accordance with the data retention policy.
- * unless this is sanctioned by a line manager or ICT.
- ~ Lost or misused equipment may well result in the user being billed for repair or replacement.
